II. Rationale

Many children in developing countries do not receive the education needed to achieve literacy. Regions with the least developed educational programs include Sub-Saharan Africa, Central Asia, Eastern Asia, and the Pacific. III. Background of the Topic

Access to education in developing countries is limited, and few people have the opportunity to graduate from middle school. For example, in Ghana, only 50% of all children complete the fifth grade.³ Due to the poor quality of education, barely half of the children are literate. The illiteracy rate of people worldwide is decreasing at a steady rate, as the percentage of illiterate people worldwide has dropped to less than 20 percent since the 1800s. Many

organizations have been working to change the standard of education in developing countries over the past several years. These organizations include BRAC in Bangladesh, Pratham in India, and Escuela Nueva in Columbia. Programs to improve adult literacy have also been implemented in developing nations. BRAC has established many of these programs in Asian and African countries for people who were born into poverty. These adults have been able to more effectively provide for their families after receiving this education.

IV. Contemporary Evidence of the Topic

Somalia and Eritrea are two countries that struggle mightily when it comes to providing a proper education for children that reside in their countries. Improving access to education in developing countries is an important objective of UNICEF. The UN has launched the "Education Cannot Wait" program to increase education sustainability in Somalia and other countries. One of every two children in the world is deprived of proper education and does not have the opportunity to go to school. Education is vital to a child's life because it can promote economic stability, brings financial improvements, and reduces susceptibility to poverty and disease.
